

“Good Faith Estimate” for Cash and Non-Insurance Items

This Good Faith Estimate is to give patients who don't have insurance or who are not using insurance an estimate of the bill for medical items and services.

- You have the right to receive a Good Faith Estimate for the expected cost of any non-insurance items or cash services. This estimate must be requested by the patient prior to the initiation of care and is inclusive of all physicians and providers of this facility. The information provided in this good faith estimate is only an estimate of items or services reasonably expected to be furnished at the time this good faith estimate. The patient recognizes and agrees that as their condition can vary, this estimate is subject to change and therefore it is not necessary upon each visit, as well as that their verbal consent to care alone is acceptable.
- Upon patient request only your health care provider gives a Good Faith Estimate in writing at the before or start of your care your medical services/item. You can also ask your health care provider, and any other provider you choose, for a Good Faith Estimate before you schedule an item or service.
- If you receive a bill that is at least \$400 more than your Good Faith Estimate, you can dispute the bill. However, as patients sign and receive a superbill receipt requesting these identified services upon each visit, patients agree and accept full financial responsibility, and that these fees are due at the time of service making it unlikely to ever exceed \$400 more than expected, as well as that these fees are nonrefundable and nonbillable to insurance. Fees not under consideration are convenience fees, supplements, diagnostics, durable goods, or orthotics.
- Patient understands and accepts full responsibility for requesting good faith estimates prior to any service, and in not doing so completely releases this entity and its agents from any related obligations. Make sure to save a copy or picture of your Good Faith Estimate.
